<u>Cumming Garden Club Uses NGC 'Plant America' Grant</u> at Poole's Mill Park

Cumming Garden Club was one of 13 clubs in Georgia awarded a "Plant America" grant by the National Garden Clubs, Inc. The winning project of the Cumming club is designed to support beautification, horticulture and landscaping efforts at Poole's Mill Park, an historic area in northwest Forsyth County. The popular site is listed on the National Registry of Historic Places and dates to before the removal of the Cherokee and the Trail of Tears. Cherokee Chief George Welch built a gristmill and sawmill at the water site. The covered bridge is one of the few remaining in Georgia.

The Cumming Garden Club has partnered with Forsyth County Parks and Recreation in maintaining the site for several years. This \$1,000. grant is being used to include a rain garden using river rock, and to install a number of native plants to enhance the space. Identifying labels are being added to identify various plants as an educational opportunity.

The design resulted from input from Avery Howell, a master landscape architect, son of Cumming club founding member Montine Howell, and brother of past president, Tricia Wester. Interim president Jill Denlea's husband, Colin, managed the logistics for the layout and rocks installation. Many of the native plants were donated by club members. Forsyth County Parks and Rec supplied mulch and pine straw used in the trails and planting areas.

Support came from the International Students' Club of Forsyth Central High School, and their instructor, Monica Jarvis. And from two high school student athletes (using those young muscles! Thank you Abigail and Preston!)

BGC Member Emphasizes: Keystone Planting Really is 'For the Birds'

Jennifer Ruscilli, Ball Ground Garden Club member, Master Gardener, Master Birder and Master Naturalist gave two programs to the club this spring on Living with Birds.

One of the keys to successful backyard birding is the establishment of a keystone plant.

Keystone plants are natives that are essential to our ecosystems because they support 90% of the caterpillar species that enable our terrestrial birds to reproduce, as well as all of our specialist native bee species. An example of a keystone plant is a tulip poplar. It is a host for caterpillars and supports the Carolina chickadee. A family of four or five baby chickadees are fed 350 to 570 caterpillars a day by their parents. Over the nesting period of around 16 days, the parents deliver 6,000 to 9,000 caterpillars. The parents seldom fly more than 160 feet from the nest, finding these caterpillars primarily in trees.



Adding keystone native plants like narrow leaved sunflower, spotted beebalm, or blue mistflower to our backyard gardens is an excellent way to encourage both native birds and pollinator species. Several birds are foundational backyard species: Brown thrasher (GA state bird), Northern cardinal, Carolina chickadee, Carolina wren, tufted titmouse and downy woodpecker. They rely on caterpillars to feed their young. There are 40 million acres of suburban lawns in the United States. If only 20 million acres were converted to gardens containing native plants our wildlife species would be flourishing. Plant a native plant in your backyard! **By Sally Metz**




Magnolias Celebrate Successful Garden Tour

Laurel District Board—MARSHALL FOREST REPORT August 18, 2022 by Caroline Alford

Marshall Forest has been the scene of much activity this spring and summer. Many community groups have worked together to help make improvements in the forest. The parking lot is full most nice days as many are using the trails as a means of getting out in nature and away from the crowds with Covid still an issue.

Andrew Saville, the son of a Garden Club Member, continues to keep the Pecan Field mowed.

The large pecan tree branches that fell during the winter storms have been removed. The Nature Conservancy Fire Crew reinstalled the Braille signs that have fallen off the stands using longer bolts, lock washers and nuts.

Tours of the forest were given on March 12th and April 19th during Garden Week in Georgia. A Garden club member's son replaced the remaining guide rope posts as his Eagle Scout project. Pressure treated lumber was used for the posts as the composite posts are on backorder for 26 months or more due to supply chain issues.

Some of the guide ropes have been replaced, but more rope has been requested from the climbing gym in Kennesaw.

Several clubs have scheduled tours of the Forest during the fall and spring.

The Robert Weed Memorial Walk will be held in October.

Marshall Forest still has many things that need to be done to keep the trail well maintained and accessible to the physically impaired.

The Fire Crew is scheduled to replace rotten boards on the wet weather creek bridge next year.

Installation of the remaining guide ropes with climbing rope donated by a climbing gym in Kennesaw.

The Nature Conservancy is working on a partnership with Berry College and Shorter University to create learning centers in the Pecan field and over to the Coosa River. The goal is to make the Marshall Forest a destination for student field trips. In addition, TNC is working to establish a working relationship with the City of Rome and TRED to apply for a GOSA grant to upgrade the trails and make other improvements close to the river.

Legislative and Government Affairs Report for July 19, 2022\ by Mickey Carlton

Laurel District Board Meeting

The Georgia Public Service Commission is set to vote July 21 on Georgia Power's Integrated Resource Plan which sets the utility's long-term plans for how it produces energy and manages infrastructure. It includes proposals for shuttering coal units, managing toxic coal ash disposal, and solar energy production, among other issues.

Georgia Power proposes to excavate the unlined pit at Plant Wansley, which previously was slated to be capped in place, this is not good enough. Georgia Power still plans to leave about 35 million tons of toxic coal ash in unlined pits where it mixes with groundwater at 4 other power plants along the Coosa, Chattahoochee, and Qcmulgee Rivers. Leaving coal ash in groundwater violates federal law.

Georgia Power proposed decommissioning the last coal units at Plant Wansley by this August. The utility proposed closing the two coal units at Plant Bowen in Bartow County by the end of 2027. The Public Service Commission is considering keeping Plant Bowen's coal units open for as many as 8 years beyond that date.

The environmental risks and economic indicators are clear. Georgia Power and the Public Service Commission need to move on from coal and focus on clean, renewable energy production. Georgia Power also needs to heed federal law and move toxic coal ash out of our groundwater and into permitted lined landfills.
